If I was to ask you to build in the desert, would you be able to do this? Probably not. It is hot and dry in the desert, and these would not be the ideal conditions!

Desert times are much in my mind, as we go further into Lent, and think of Jesus being tempted on the desert. This was just after his baptism, and then he had 40 days of struggle and temptation, repeatedly learning to put the will of His heavenly Father above his own. This was his time of preparation for his ministry.

For the Israelites, when they were set free from slavery in Egypt, they spent 40 years in the desert. They had to learn to trust that God would provide for them, how to look after each other, how to live out their commitment to God. They had to undergo this time of trial, before they were ready to build.

And so what the bible repeatedly shows is that in the desert, God builds our character and strengthens our faith, to then equip us to build worshipping communities. When the Israelites eventually settled in Jerusalem, they could build the temple. It was when Jesus emerged from the desert, his ministry amongst the people started.

It feels like we have lived through desert times, the restrictions and fears from the pandemic years, reductions and changes in church resources, conflict at home and abroad, and economic uncertainty. These have been disorientating and troubling years.



However, with the message of Easter, we are reminded of streams in the desert, new life, and new possibilities of growth. After the desert times, come times of greater stability, and

March 2023 is a significant month for Knightswood Anniesland Trinity church and for St David's Knightswood church, for at the end of this month we vote about our buildings usage for the future. For over a year, we have considered the result of community audits, looked at the fabric of our buildings, their usage by the community, transport links, and the possibilities of development for the 21st century. I am grateful to all who have contributed to this process.

Over this time we have been working with the organisation "Designed to Succeed", who have the experience and skills to help us. They have constantly asked the question- what is your plan for outreach? For whatever configuration of buildings we have in the future, the founding principle to take into account is what is our vision to enable a loving, growing Christian community, which can effectively serve the people around us?

And so there is a presentation on 5th March at 1.30pm till 3pm, when Gary MacFarlane from Designed to Succeed, and the architect Raymond Angus will present the two buildings options to us.

(On a practical note, if you are bringing your car, you can add your car registration number to the list in the church, and we apply for car parking exemption for the day. You need to park in Morrisons side of the car park)

These options have been agreed by the parish Grouping, ie the elders from the churches involved.

- For the building of St Margaret's to be our main worshipping centre, with St David's church building to be kept for outreach and community activities for a period of time.
- 2. For the building of Temple Anniesland church to be our main worshipping centre, with St David's church building to be kept for outreach and community activities for a period of time.

There are many pros and cons for each option, and we have asked our architect to survey our buildings, and to look at possibilities for development, and also costings, and to report back on 5th March. This presentation will also give time for questions and clarifications. So please come along to hear what is involved, and to share your thoughts.

After this meeting, the parish grouping (the elders from all the churches) will consider all the different factors, and will make a recommendation of one option, for **the two congregations to vote on 26th March after worship**. All members and adherents have the opportunity to vote. Please make sure you are on the adherents list in advance and notice that you are only able to vote if you are present.

We would so appreciate your prayers for this process, and for wisdom as to what is the best decision.

If you have any questions, please do get in touch. We have taken advice, and been told that no postal or zoom votes are possible. The only people who can vote, are the people who come on the day, and it is by secret ballot. **Please note it is in the St Margaret's building.**

This process is happening at Lent, and after prayer and soul searching, we come to Easter, after death is resurrection, after darkness is light, after suffering come possibilities of joy. We have all had to let go of some of our habits and familiar thought patterns from the past. But we are called to something new and exciting, a modern building which is flexible and fit for purpose, where the Christian community can grow and thrive. That is our vision, and it is one of hope, new life and possibility. We are doing this not just for ourselves, but for the next generation, and for the community which we serve. This is our motivation and our prayer, for the next step in our journey.

We are hoping to give to this charity on 5th March at our joint service, and we thought it would be useful to share a little about them, so below we have shared their vision statement, and something about their work.

Vision statement



To see wholeness, purpose and unity restored in people and communities across the nations of the world through the powerful love and practical action of Jesus Christ and His Kingdom.

We work with our partners in Rwanda, DR Congo, Burundi, South Sudan and Uganda to bring lasting transform to lives and communities.

Our work includes:

Providing healthcare and hospital facilities in DR Congo. Identifying and rescuing street kids and giving them a

loving home.

Facilitating healing and reconciliation in post-genocide and conflict communities.

Supporting vulnerable mums and their babies.

Providing education, training and help to start a business. Rehabilitating ex-child soldiers.

Providing church leadership training.

Since our foundation in 1999, we have worked closely with local partners to ensure that people can become self-sufficient long after we have helped them.

Knightswood Anniesland Trinity Church

The meetings are fair piling up, the deadline approaches and the decision will have to be taken. "What decision is that?" I hear you ask and in return I ask "Where have you been these last 2 years?" Only joking, I'm sure we're all aware that soon, very soon we will meet as a congregation and vote upon which buildings we want to hold on to and which we are willing to let go.

This will not be easy. It's a bit like that old pair of slippers, so comfy, so handy, so well-known, I won't say well-loved, who could love a pair of old slippers, especially mine? They have to go however, and it won't be long until our feet are well accustomed to the new ones. As for our buildings, we know them well we don't get lost in them and, in some cases, we know they look a bit worn out and in need of smarting up but they're our buildings and we're happy in them.

Personally, because of the afore mentioned meetings, there are bits and places in all of our three buildings that I'm getting used to and if it was open to me I reckon I could fill a new empty building with my favourite bits and be perfectly happy. That is not an option, however. The plans being laid before us tell us that even if we keep our preferred building it's going to have to change internally if not externally to meet the challenges of the new Scotland we now live and worship in.

The main thing is that when we come to make this decision, as many as are able will come on the day, hear the options and make their vote, so we know that whatever happens, the majority of the members are in favour of it. A question was asked at our meeting last night (15th February) about proxy voting. The answer was given by Rev Hilary McDougall, Depute Clerk and Moderator of Glasgow Presbytery: "In line with procedure at the General Assembly, there will be no proxy votes." If you are not at the meeting to hear the business, you cannot vote. It's tough, but it does mean that the votes will be cast after hearing the discussions and not based on loyalty to our "own" buildings. That's the hope and I trust you will agree with it.

At present Beatrice and myself are preparing the 2022 accounts and we have had several meetings with the examiner to get these ready to present to the Kirk Session on 1st March.

2022 was a busy year for us with the union between St Margaret's and Temple Anniesland Parish Churches but everything is now in order under the name of Knightswood Anniesland Trinity Church. St Margaret's was left a legacy in a member's will but unfortunately as this was still in the name of St Margaret's the solicitor handling the estate has stated that the legacy will fall as St Margaret's no longer exists. The law department of the Church of Scotland has taken this up on our behalf but to save this problem arising in the future, I would ask that if anyone has already written a legacy for the church into their will or is thinking of doing this, please ensure that the name of the church is listed as Knightswood Anniesland Trinity.

I would like to thank everyone for their generosity when we have had special collections, retiring offerings, coffee mornings etc especially in the last 2 months of 2022 when it seemed that there was something on every week! We are a relatively small congregation but in 2022 we raised £7084 for charities. Well done to everyone.

As everyone is aware, we are still using both buildings and so costs for heating and lighting are still very high and so I would once again ask that everyone remains diligent when using the church premises to ensure that we are not paying for heating and lighting when the premises are not in use.

We think of her love of singing and playing the accordion, and her amazing gift of language, and her appreciation of words and blessings, and her gift for leading the Thursday service especially.

We think of Nancy's courage in moving to Glasgow, and of working life, and all those she helped. We remember her marriage to Harry, and her great joy and pride in her children Henry and Clare, and then in her grandchildren Lauren, Ellie and Jessica. Nancy loved them all so much, and we are so thankful for that family trip to Orkney when Nancy was 80, and for all the fun and connections rediscovered.
