From the Interim Minister

What's happening with...?

It's a bit tricky to write something for the magazine that will come out in a few weeks, as by the time you read it some things will have already moved on.

I could write about our programme for Advent and Christmas, but by the time you get the magazine we'll already be well into Advent and had our Bereavement Service, been involved in Christmas Reflection Rooms at Knightswood Secondary School and so on. You will see from the posters and flyers that there is quite a long list of services and events planned for the month, and I hope that these will be an opportunity for celebrating in fellowship with each other and perhaps reaching out into our community. Remember we are all hosts to any visitors to our congregation, so keep an eye out for new folk and best foot forward!

In terms of the behind the scenes work, the closing date for bids for the St Margaret's building has passed and a bid has been accepted by the Session and the General Trustees. We can't say much more about this yet as the whole sale process needs to play out and this can take a few

months, but as soon as we can share more, we will. A task group has been appointed by the kirk session to deal with the sale and in particular with the removal of any items from St Margaret's that will not be included in the sale, once that is clear from the negotiations, and taking into account the guidance we have received from General Trustees. If you have any specific requests please put these in writing to the office email (office@katchurch.org.uk) and they will be forwarded to the task group for consideration.

A Refurbishment Task Group is up and running for the Anniesland building and we presented an architect's brief to the Kirk Session based on the consultations held with congregation and other groups. With this brief approved, nine different architect firms have been approached and they have seen around the building for a first impression. They have then come back to us with fee proposals and their track records with similar projects. We will be shortlisting 2 or 3 firms to interview as a whole Task Group. Then we will hopefully be able to recommend one firm to the Kirk Session, for them to begin a feasibility study to explore the options for the refurbishment.

I have summarised the architect's brief elsewhere in the magazine, but we should all be aware that our wish list may well be longer than what we can



afford with the funds available, and choices will need to be made as to what has priority. All the same, it is exciting to begin in earnest with this much needed work. In the meantime, there is still plenty to do and develop in terms of governance and congregational life. I am excited to be holding membership classes with three young people looking to join the church formally early in the new year. It has been very encouraging to hear what it means to them to find or develop one's faith in God and to be part of a church community.

God is good, and Jesus still calling people to follow him. It's good to realise once more what the church is actually all about at its heart!

I hope that in this time of Advent we will all remember that we are not just looking back to the first arrival of Christ as a baby in Bethlehem, but we're looking forward with expectation to the coming of Christ in the present, and the return of Christ at the end of this age. There is so much broken in our lives, our churches and our world, but God still comes to save, heal and fix what is broken, until all things are made new in Him.

Architect's brief summary

Project Objectives

The redevelopment should:

- Address the urgent, essential and (where applicable) desirable items raised in the building survey of March 2024.
- Improve accessibility and inclusivity for all users throughout the building.
- Make the entrances into the building (especially the halls) more welcoming and inviting for passers-by and those new to the building.
- Make the sanctuary into a multi-purpose space, whilst retaining the distinct feel of a worshipful space.
- Provide flexible meeting spaces adaptable to various types of meetings and group sizes, including other forms of worship.
- Optimise the use of internal spaces throughout the week, not only Sundays, so ensuring the building will meet the needs of the congregation into the future when longer term we may just have one set of buildings.
- Improve energy efficiency and reduce ongoing operating costs.
- Preserve and celebrate the building's spiritual and historic character.

Design & Character Guidance

- The building should feel **welcoming, warm and light**.
- The building needs to be a safe and good place to be for people of all ages and stages, backgrounds and abilities.
- The sanctuary as well as the other spaces are to be fit as meeting places with God, reflecting the love and welcome of God to all people.
- A balance is to be struck between honouring the heritage of the building, practical needs and a building fit for the 21st century.

Materials should be durable, sustainable, and low maintenance.

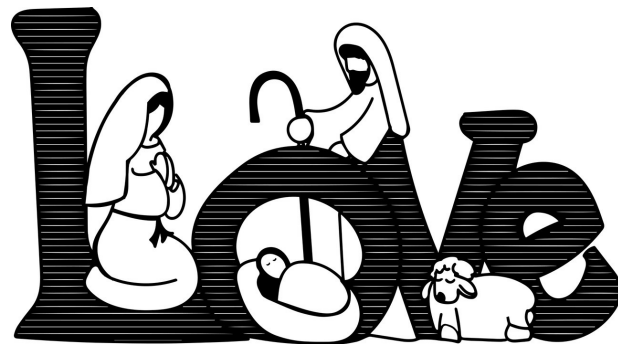
You will find details of these and all our services and events later in the magazine. You can also check out the church website or pick up a flier

Another unrecorded death was made known to me just last week by a neighbour of the member who passed away some time ago. It's not how we'd like it to be but we depend on family, Care Home staff, friends and other members to help us stay in touch.

With what we do know currently, the roll stands at 372.

Ways to give to the Church

It is coming up to Christmas-time, when we celebrate God giving us the best gift of all in the person of His Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour. Because of that, we give gifts to each other on December 25th. Sometimes the gift is useful and thoughtful, but at other times it can be received gratefully and then never touched again.

But if you give to the church by Gift Aid then your gift has great value from the moment it arrives, as the church is able to claim 25% more than you give at no extra cost to you.

If you have not given by Gift Aid before but pay sufficient tax to cover your offerings amount, please see me and I will happily give you a form to fill in and sign. **You do not need to provide your bank account details.** All that is needed is your first name and surname, address, postcode, signature and date, and a tick in the box saying you are a UK taxpayer and understand that if the amount of Gift Aid claimed is more than you pay in tax (highly unlikely – virtually impossible!) you are responsible for paying any difference.

Paying by Standing Order is far more convenient than using envelopes, as there is no need for you to look out money each Sunday, it means the church pays less money when ordering envelopes, it saves the Count Team time in counting the money after the service and also ensures that if you are away on a Sunday for any reason the money is still paid in, either weekly or (preferably) monthly. Already more people are giving this way, and as new envelopes will soon be ordered for 2026, if you could tell Audrey Spence or me that you are changing to this method of giving it would save the church money.

If, however, your circumstances change you can cancel your Gift Aid at any

time by notifying me in writing. Please think carefully and prayerfully about this, and see me to fill in a form (or just change to giving through the bank – once it's set up you don't need to do anything else unless you wish to change the amount given).

Have a blessed Christmas as you remember the best Gift of all!

Blythswood Shoeboxes

This year I filled 165 shoeboxes and 20 were filled by friends in the congregation. Total 185 boxes.

Thanks to all who filled boxes, gave me things to put in them or money to buy things to fill the boxes. Special thanks to Margaret Rattray whose knitting club, especially Irene, knitted or crochet many beautiful scarves, and her Bowling Club kindly donated £20 towards transporting the boxes to Eastern Europe and Ukraine.

The cost of transporting our boxes is £555 (£3 a box). The retiring collection in June raised £85, people gave me £362 and I put in £108 to make up the short fall.

Last year over 85,000 boxes were sent, 1/3 of them going to Ukraine. Every box is valued by those who receive them - people who have so little.

If anyone has empty shoeboxes anytime during the year, I will be delighted to receive them.

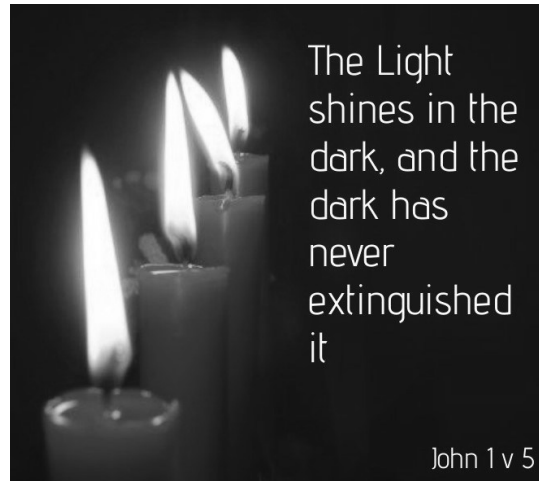

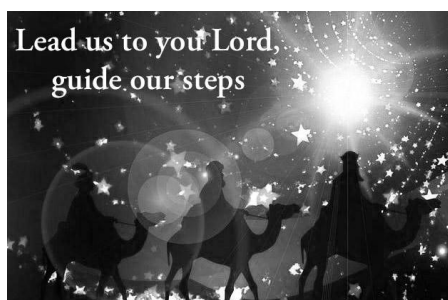
