This might be the last time I write to you here – at least in this capacity. We're on the edge of another change as you will well aware of. By the time you read this you be welcoming and getting to know your new Interim

Minister. You may not know this, but I know Hanneke and regard her very highly. We met as I was a supervisor to her husband, Aaron (who has now completed his training to be a Minister in the Church of Scotland). Aaron and I had a great time working together and I have no doubt that you will enjoy working with Hanneke just as much. I'm delighted that she has taken on this role and believe wholeheartedly that she will guide you well over the next couple of years.

As you know I have been able to serve as Interim Moderator, first at St David's and then more recently for Knightswood Anniesland Trinity. Taken together, I have been alongside you for just over a year and have enjoyed all of this time very much. It has not always been an easy task – for any of us involved in leadership and in making decisions and in carrying the load of expectations. But I recognise the journey that you've all been on and that has helped me and I hope in turn, you. I know the pain and loss that Unions and Adjustments bring to us. And yet for all of that, I am so encouraged by all that I have seen. From far away, I wondered what I might find in meeting all of you. I came to listen, to get alongside you as individuals and to hear your story. And what I've found is a story of great resilience, purpose and honest hard work. I hear very clearly from you that there is a strong desire to be moving forward – and

this perspective I believe is essential and commendable as you chart to the next part of the adventure to which God has called you to.

I'm hopeful that I can be a good friend to you still and that our time together will not end. It is possible that I may be able to serve Presbytery further as a part of the new set of relationships that are involved in Interim Ministry. But that is not my gift to give. We'll need to wait and see. Either way, I'm sure that we can all learn for the encouragements that Paul shared in his letters – like this one – to the church in Corinth ...

'So then, my dear friends, stand firm and steady. Keep busy always in your work for the Lord, since you know that nothing you do in the Lord's service is ever useless.' (1 Corinthians 15: 58)



Let me share with you two formal matters that won't be new to you, but I think it is good to see in black and white. Both come from our most recent Presbytery meeting and are pertinent to you as a congregation ...

Presbytery Business Committee report:

"Note that by determination dated 19 November 2024 the General Trustees authorised the sale of Knightswood St Margaret's Church, 2000 Great Western Road, Glasgow, G13 2HA, at such price and on such other terms and conditions as may be decided by them in consultation with the Kirk Session and determined that the free proceeds of sale shall, subject to the operation of the Levy under Sections 10-17 of Schedule 3 of the General Trustees (Properties, Funds & Endowments) Act 2024, be credited to the benefit of the congregation in the Consolidated Fabric Fund."

"Noting that at a congregational meeting of Knightswood Anniesland Trinity held on 11 December there voted 47 in favour and one against appointing an Interim Ministry, instruct the Clerk to intimate the vote to the Ministries Development Manager to facilitate the appointment of such a ministry."

Hello everyone at KAT Church!



I have been asked to introduce myself a little bit through your magazine ahead of my appointment as your interim minister. My service of

introduction (organised by Glasgow Presbytery) will be on the 13th of March, but I will join the interim and transition ministry team from the 3rd of March so will then begin getting to know key people in your congregation and so on.

At the time of writing (beginning of February), I am still the minister of St Machar's Ranfurly Church in Bridge of Weir, Renfrewshire. I have been here for nearly 8 years – I was ordained and inducted here in March 2017. I have loved my time here, and ministry in general. It was a long journey to get here, as I was born and grew up in the Netherlands, studied theology and trained for ministry there (now some 25 years ago!) but met my husband Aaron in Durham and left for the UK after finishing my studies in 2002. I then worked as a secondary RE teacher for a few years, we moved from England to Northern Ireland and had our family, Lukas, Lois and Tabitha. We had a business, and I also was the main carer for our young children. The call to ministry however raised its head as I was actively involved in our local Presbyterian Church of Ireland congregation. After a number of testing experiences, we decided to explore the Church of Scotland and I was admitted and placed on probation in Duns and District Parishes, in the Scottish Borders. We moved across in October 2015. And, as I have already said, I was eventually ordained into my present charge in March 2017. I have never looked back, finding great fulfilment in ministry – never mind the often challenging circumstances and wider context of the Church in a ever more secular society.

Preaching, teaching and leadership are my particular interests, as well as a creative approach to mission and outreach. I was drawn to interim ministry as I like to think people, problems and processes through and try to figure out how we can move from A to B. After I leave my current charge, the congregation will be voting on a basis of union with the other congregation in the village and so for the past 8 years I have in a sense been an 'interim minister' already. I have played an active part in helping my congregation to trust and work more closely together with the other church, build relationships and reach out together to our village in mission and outreach. It has not always been easy, for me or for them, especially as my own congregation are set to see their minister go and their building close, and I knew my tenure would come to an end, but this has given me great insight and empathy for what feelings and problems can be involved in unions between churches. However, I have also seen how congregations can grow towards each other and discover new energy and friendship together, through obedience to Jesus' call and the work of the Holy Spirit.

I very much look forward to getting to know you and hear your stories, and help you discover God's story with you and call to you for the future.

A simple guide to Praying out loud

There are several reasons why people don't pray out loud in a group.

Some have no experience with it and this is especially true of new Christians. Some find it scary: to hear their own voices talking to the God of the universe may feel presumptuous.

Some feel intimidated: they're certain that they aren't eloquent enough to pray with those who are more experienced. This is especially true if they've been in a group where someone prayed in perfect King James English or if there are wide educational, or cultural differences in the group. Some

people are just naturally shy. They not only don't pray aloud; they do everything they can to avoid speaking in a group.

Would it surprise you to hear that 10 years ago, I was in that very position; hesitant to pray out loud, or even speak out in a group, because I was worried I wouldn't use the right words and appear stupid.

But, with God's help, I have learnt that God does not care about the specific words you use when praying, but rather focuses on the sincerity and attitude of your heart; the content of your thoughts and feelings are more important than the eloquence of your words when communicating with Him.

God always hears our prayers, and he always responds to them in love – regardless of the quality or quantity of the one speaking them. He is our loving Father in Heaven, and He wants to hear from you. When you speak to God, you can speak to him just as you would to any other person. You are having a conversation with God. You do not need to use fancy words. It is more important to open your heart and not hold back. Believe He is there and listening because He is. Believe He will help you because He will.

For those not familiar with prayer meetings, while these may seem daunting if you have not participated before, they are spiritually uplifting as the prayers of the group are brought to our heavenly Father. These meetings are usually led by one of the group, and leaders have different ways of doing this, but the main purpose is to break the prayer time into short sections and guide our prayer by topics, for example: adoration,

confession and thanksgiving, our own church congregation and office bearers, our community, the wider world. These are just some of the topics that are used and the group leader will guide according to what is happening in our world and in our own congregation.

You may feel unable to pray aloud the first couple of times you attend, but just by being there you are adding your prayers to those of the group. You could even write down a short prayer beforehand to pray during the prayer time. With time you may feel more comfortable with praying out loud more frequently, but there is never any pressure to do so.

The main things to remember in a prayer meeting are:

- Don't feel intimidated. Others may have been attending these meetings for a long time, and may be more eloquent, but everyone's prayers are important to God
- Don't feel you have to pray in lengthy paragraphs. A simple sentence or two will tell God what is on your heart.
- Once you've said all that you want to say, you can end your prayer by saying, "These things I pray in the name of Jesus Christ, Amen"
- Add your "Amen" to other people's prayers too to show you agree with them.
- Silent prayer is just as valid as praying out loud, meaning you can participate in a prayer meeting by praying silently in your heart and mind if you choose to do so.

And remember: "Be joyful always; pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

We all like a gift – right? So does your church! If you pay tax then the church can recover the tax you have already paid on the money you give in your offering, increasing its value by 25%. That means that (for example) £20 becomes £25 and £100 becomes £125 at no extra cost to you. The total amount received in Gift Aid is sent to HMRC and KAT Church receives this money every 3 months.

Many people in KAT already give by Gift Aid either through a Standing Order or Bank Transfer paid from their bank, or through the weekly freewill offering envelopes, and this is much appreciated.

Some members generously give a substantial amount to the church, but as no Gift Aid form has been filled in, the 25% can not be claimed. If you are one of those people, *please* Gift Aid it!

If you have not given by Gift Aid before but pay sufficient tax to cover your offerings amount, please see me and I will happily give you a form to fill in and sign. All that is needed is your first name and surname, address, postcode, signature and date, as the church details are already filled in.

If, however, your circumstances change, you can cancel your Gift Aid at any time by notifying me in writing.

Our young leaders are busy with school exam preparations so have less time for meeting together, but they keep in touch to offer support to each other.

Church Choir


